

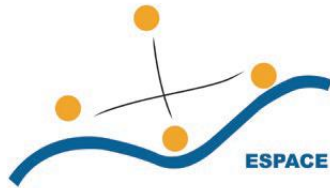

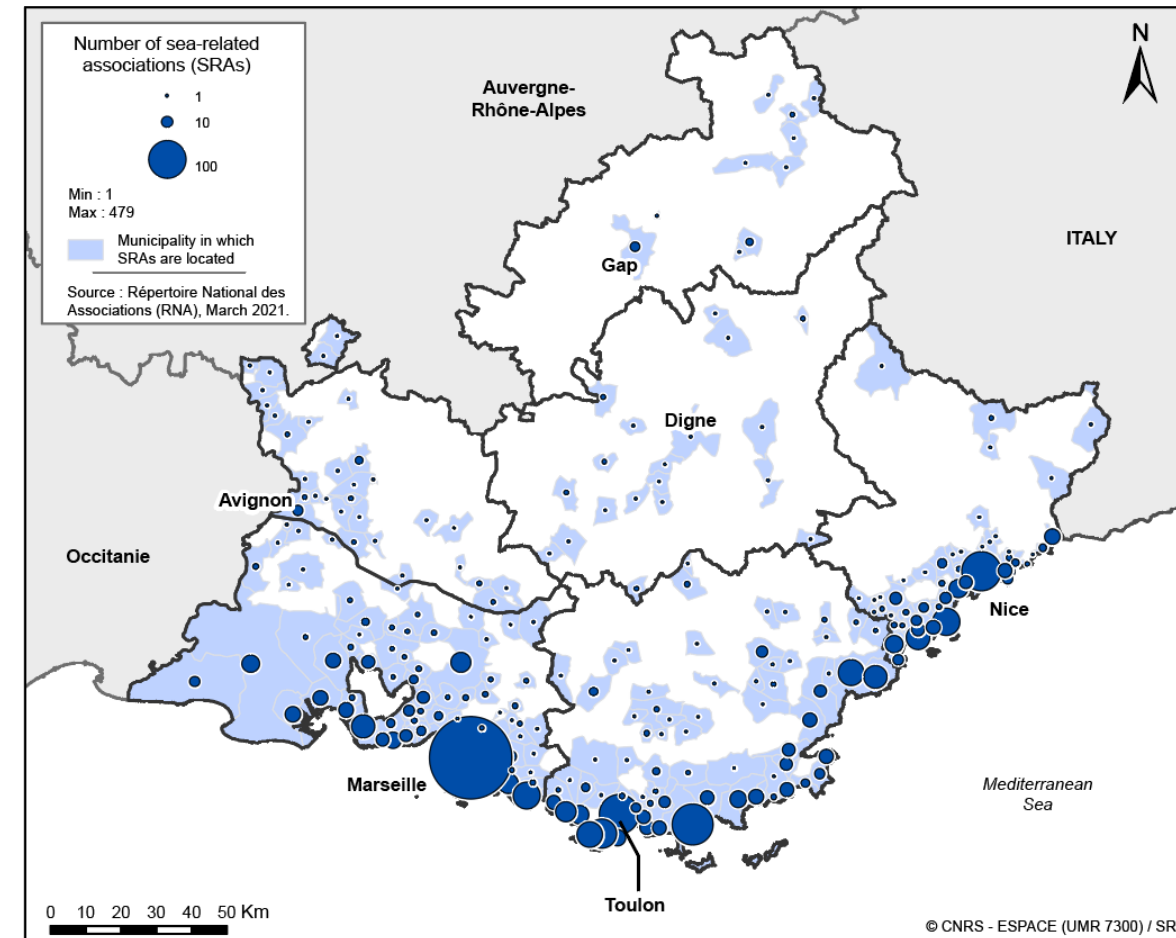
A project grounded on the concept of « maritimité » / maritimity...

The set of **relationships that bind human societies to the sea, which contribute to the making of specific landscapes**, representations and cultures (Péron and Rieucou 1996).

A cultural geography concept, it was developed by geographers specialising in the coast and the sea, who wanted to design a conceptual tool for describing and analysing **the maritime character of a population**.

By extension, maritimity can be used to **characterise a portion of geographic space**. Precisely because the populations whose maritimity we seek to understand are geographically located, **the concept of maritimity can be applied to the region where they live**.

Associations (NGO) having a link with the sea in PACA Region



... combined with the concept of liveability / « Habitabilité »

In large coastal cities, **city-sea interactions** are manifold and crucial to habitability.

The sea fascinates and offers **opportunities** to these cities, but it can also be a source of **nuisance, danger and injustice**.

Conversely, cities exert **pressure on the marine environment** and coastal territory, while at the same time developing **public policies** relating to the sea.

The **maritimity of these cities**, i.e. the way in which the marine participates in urban identity, permeates **inhabitants' lifestyles, structures the economy, space and settlement**, induces opportunities but also constraints for **the future**.

In the Mediterranean, some twenty towns with more than 500,000 inhabitants are located by the sea. They provide a relevant framework for such a study, with their **current habitability strongly linked to the sea**.

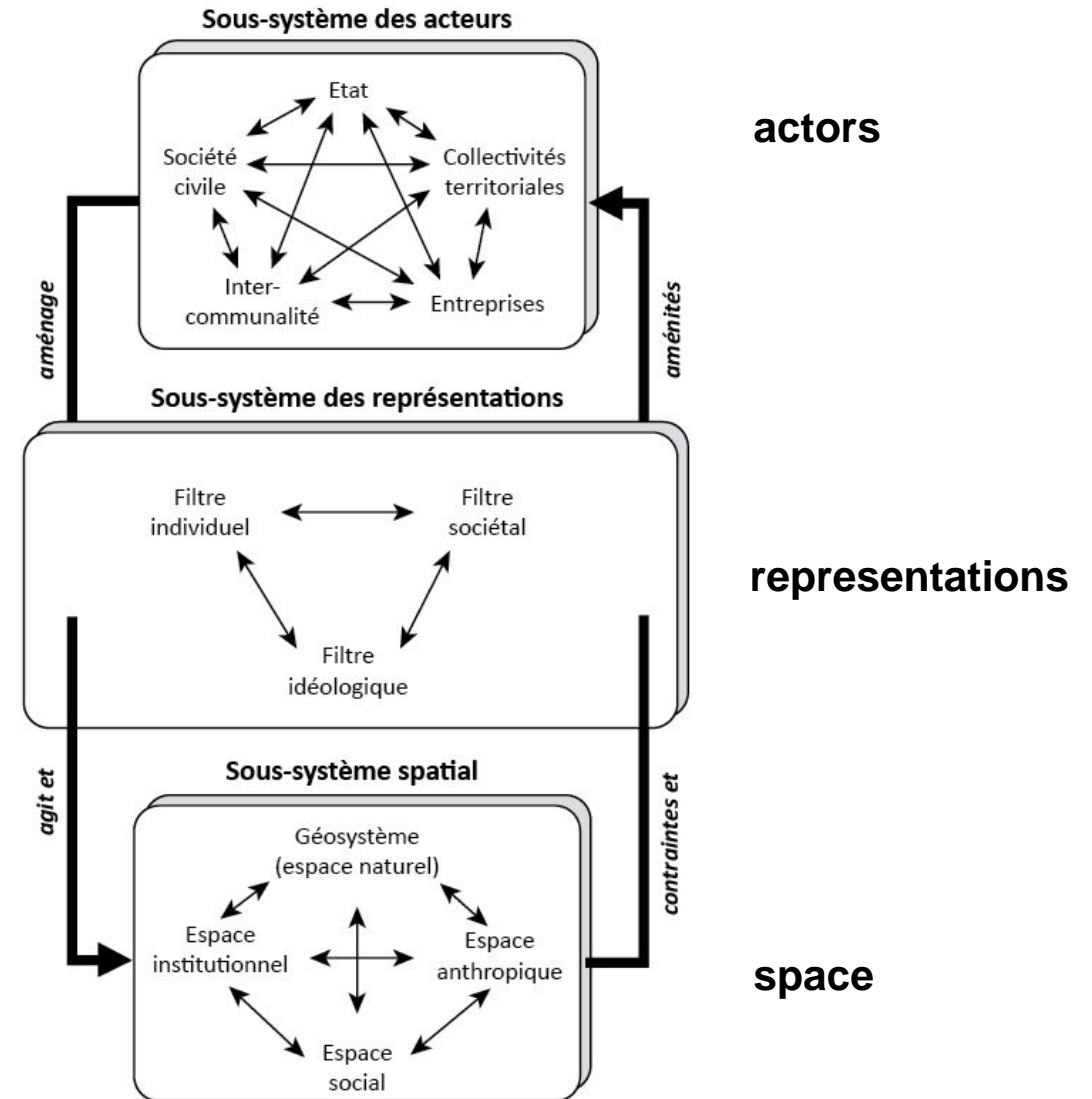
Conceptual framework: the maritimity of a territory

Maritimity

Refers to the set of relationships that bind human societies to the sea, which contribute to the making of specific landscapes, representations and cultures (Péron et Rieucou, 1996)

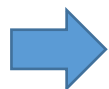
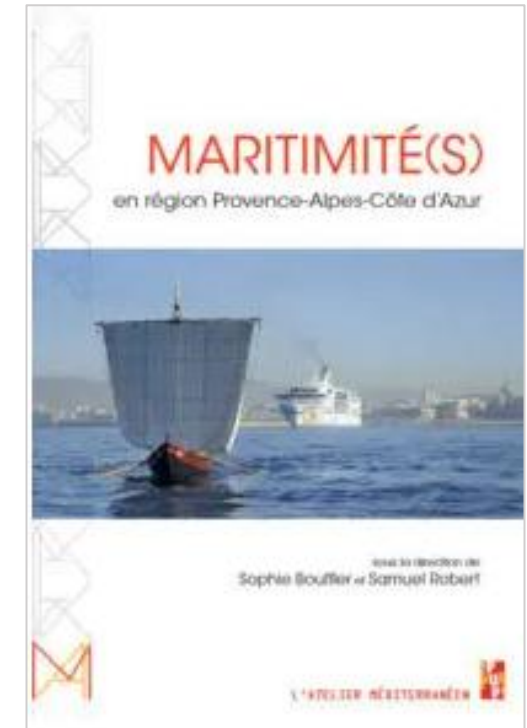
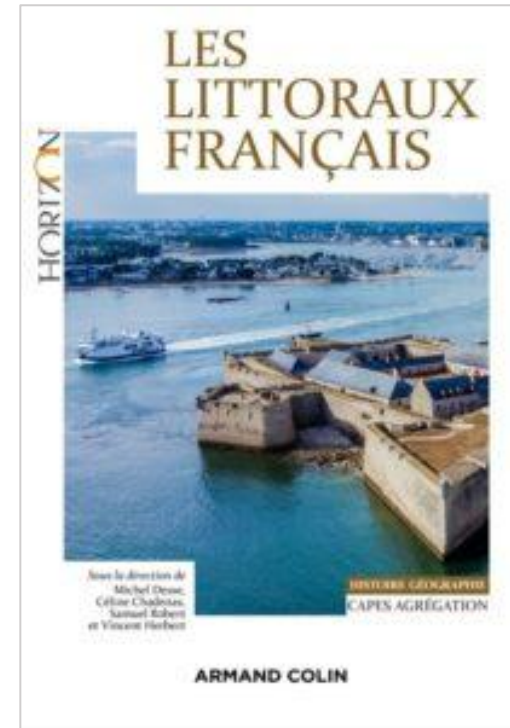
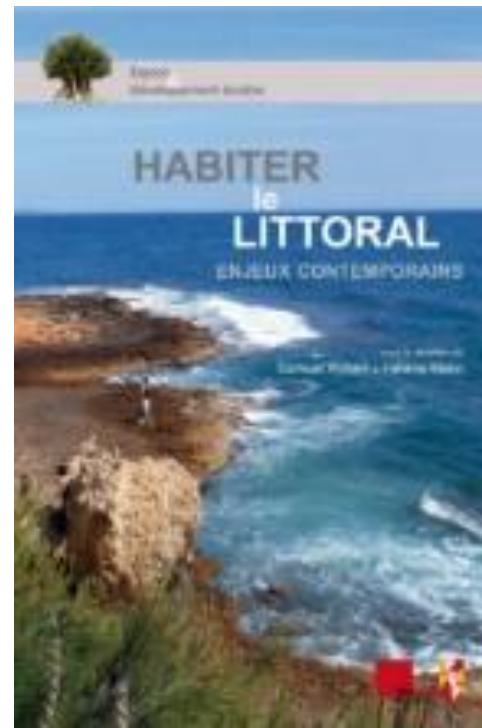
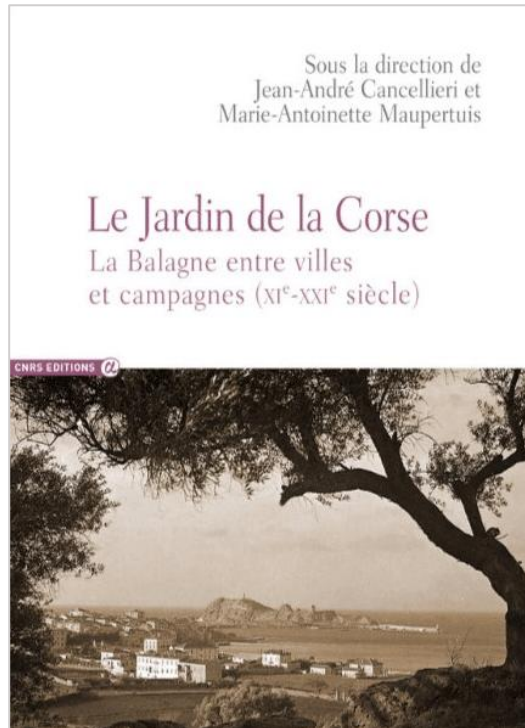
refers to an appropriated and administered portion of land, with geographical, biophysical, legal, social, cultural and symbolic characteristics (Brunet, 1993 ; Le Berre, 1995; Moine, 2006). System of interactions between a human community and its geographical living space.

Take advantage of this diversity to explore differences and similarities

Planned activities

Thematic seminars, joint work, PhD mobility, the building of a **shared knowledge base**, connexions **with the local stakeholders** in the major cities concerned.

The aim is:

- to create a **community of knowledge** and practice between researchers and local stakeholders ;
- to generate academic knowledge, which will be published in the form of **articles** and a **collective book** at the end of the 5-year project.

Programme

2025

- May: **MaritiMedSeaties' kick-off meeting, Marseille**
- October: **Thematic seminar 1, Naples** - Maritimity, port development and habitability

2026

- February: **1st Call for Doctoral Mobility** to be carried out before december 2026 (1 mobility)
- April: **Thematic seminar 2, Barcelona** - Maritimity, adaptation to coastal risks and habitability
- November: **call for papers for an international conference on liveable coastal cities** (to be held in october 2027)

2027



- February: **2nd Call for Doctoral Mobility** to be carried out before december 2027 (1 mobility)
- April: **Thematic seminar 3, Tunis** : Maritimity, ecological and energy transition and habitability
- October: **International conference, Marseille «liveable coastal cities »**

2028

- February: **3rd Call for Doctoral Mobility** to be carried out before december 2028 (1 mobility)
- April: **Thematic seminar 4, Genoa** : Maritimity, access to the sea and habitability

2029

- February: **4th Call for Doctoral Mobility** to be carried out before december 2029 (1 mobility)
- October: **MaritiMedSeaties' closing seminar, Marseille**

Administrative information

Budget

- MaritiMedSealties is funded by CNRS-SHS : 14,000 euros per year
- Each team hosting an event tries to get additional funding
 - For the launching meeting in Marseille, already 3000 euros obtained from ESPACE and ECCOREV

Participants

- The consortium may evolve over the 5-year period: new teams may join the project.

Project outputs

- The objective is to create new academic links and support the building of new projects.
- PhD & Master students mobility
- Collective publication + thematic papers

Activities within the project

Meeting principles and objectives

Meeting = 3 days

- One day: workshop
- One day: field trip/visits
- One day: project news, general news regarding the project subject from our cities, news from PhD students
- Each meeting has a specific objective, includes working sessions between participants and between participants and partners (workshops). **Discussions and debate should prevail** over academic presentations
- Meetings should give the opportunity to promote the **connexion between academics and stakeholders**
- PhD students should be given the floor to present their research



Activities within the project

Meeting principles and objectives

- The 4 research directions must be treated in each city to allow a **comparative approach**, even though each city can be viewed as a place where one topic is more critical.
- Before each thematic seminar, the organising team sends to the other teams instructions to collect information on the theme in their city → getting everyone prepared to the theme, sharing knowledge, comparing situations



PhD students mobility

- 4 calls
- Each team is entitled to host a doctoral student



Possibility to open the call to Master degree students (2nd year).

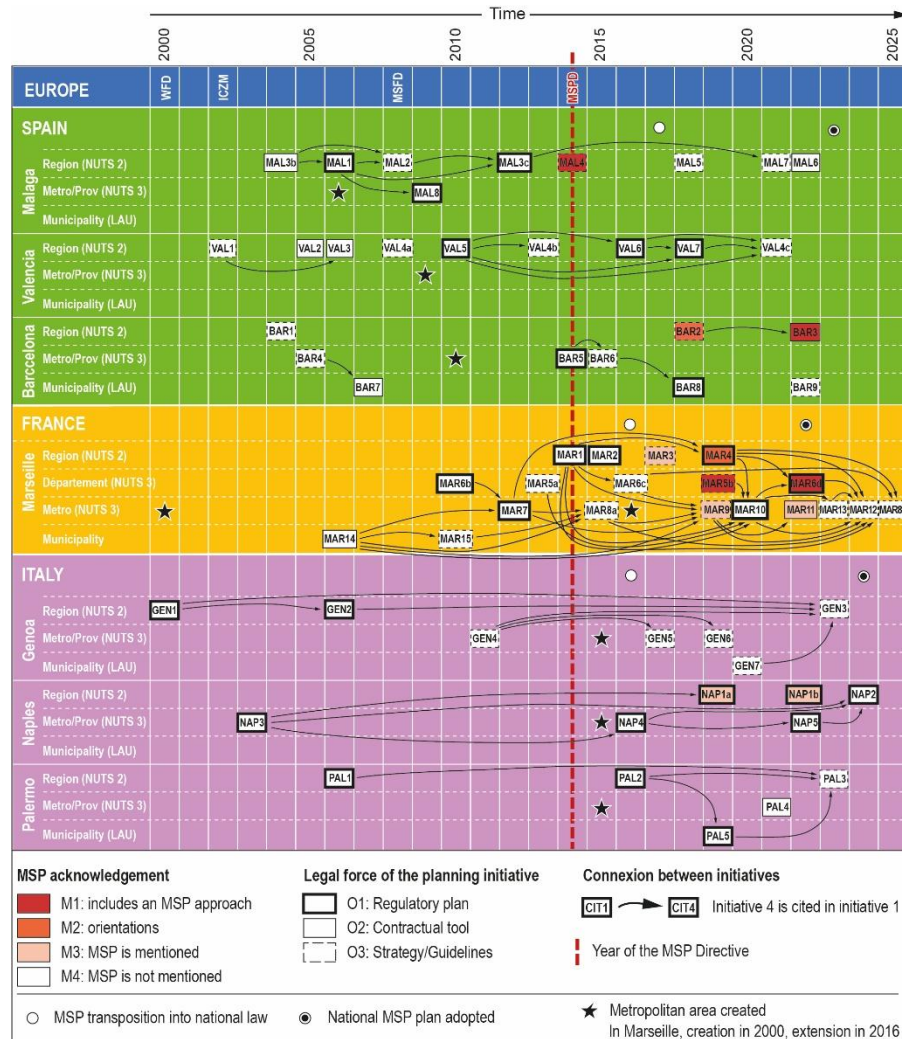
